AFRCC Basic Inland Search Course Dan Conley	The Basic Inland SAR Course (BISC) was developed in the 1970's to bring search management information to search mission managers in the Civil Air Patrol, State and Federal agencies within the United States. The course is administered by the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center (AFRCC). The BISC is a three-day course designed to teach basic federal SAR architecture and resources and mission coordination, with an introduction to search theory. The course is designed as an entry level SAR management course for federal, state, and local SAR responders.
	Course Description Academic areas of instruction include a Federal SAR Architecture Overview, AFRCC Overview and Mission types, SAR Resources, Introduction to Search Theory, and Mission Coordination. The course culminates with a scenario-based tabletop exercise.
Traumatic vs. Medical Emergency Shawn Beane	Not every emergency is created equally. There are significant differences between the two main types of emergencies you may encounter, and EFAF will teach you how to systematically assess and address both.
Additional \$25 fee	You'll learn what to do if you witness traumatic emergencies such as serious falls, car accidents, or even gunshot wounds, and medical emergencies like heart attack, cardiac arrest, diabetic emergencies, stroke, seizures, hypothermia, heatstroke, venomous snakebites, and many more.
Criminal Investigations and Processing of the Outdoor Scene Joe Gorski	Outdoor crime scenes - at any stage - can be a tricky situation. Thanks in part to more Search and Rescue Teams assigned to assist in outdoor crime scenes, there is a further need to establish protocols and information to be on the lookout associated with the investigation. It is incredibly important to mark and leave all potential evidence in the outdoor scene undisturbed prior to notation of its precise location and orientation relative to the body, other evidence, and to features of the location. The focus is not just on the recognition and collection of physical evidence at the scene, but also on the careful notation of the precise relative position of physical evidence.  Within this training session, the techniques associated with criminal investigations for processing outdoor scenes will be introduced and reviewed. Search and Rescue Teams will be provided with specific context on where to look for potential evidence, what to do when evidence or remains are located as well as the importance of preserving all evidence locations for the well-trained crime scene investigator. The working assumption is that if context is carefully noted, then very accurate, very precise, scientifically defensible
CSIM	reconstructions of sequences of past events can be created.  All emergency response personnel experience symptoms of Critical Incident Stress. The presentation covers stress reactions & symptoms, the types of incidents that may warrant debriefings, as well as the services available to first responders.
Drones Hanover Township	Hanover Township Emergency Services will be providing information on the pros and cons of drone usage as it relates to search and rescue. This will also include a practical exercise from the HTES pilots.

Field Encounters	This indoor/outdoor session will discuss some of the things that search teams might encounter while in the field, such as drug labs, grow fields, booby traps,
	etc. The session will discuss how to report to search management and avoid these field encounters safely.
An Overview of Forensic Anthropology Dr. Krista Latham	This session will introduce attendees to the field of forensic anthropology and the ways in which a forensic anthropologist can contribute to death investigations: the recovery of human remains, supporting efforts towards positive identification, estimation of time since death, and the interpretation of skeletal trauma. It will focus heavily on the recovery of human remains from outdoor contexts with a discussion of the training required and techniques practiced in forensic archeology. The workshop will also address the five stages of excavation and recovery employed by the University of Indianapolis Human Identification Center, as well as search techniques for scattered and buried human remains. The workshop will close with several case studies followed by a question-and-answer session.
K9 Flanking 2.0 Carol Lussky	This session will be a follow-up on last year's session: "How to Flank a Search Dog". We'll do a brief recap and then it's out in the field. We'll have several SAR dogs attending and will do some trails where you can see the dogs in action and see how they work. We'll also do HRD exercises so you can see the difference.
National Crisis Response Canines	Certified National Crisis Response Canine teams receive extensive training to safely respond to a crisis or disaster. We offer support to victims and the responders who help them, using the special human + canine bond to inspire resilience.  Presenter: Erin Hampton and her crisis canine Serene.
Salvation Army Dwain Hill	This session will give presenters an overview of the Salvation Army emergency services and capabilities offered statewide, with an emphasis on our emergency disaster response capabilities and how to access them. An example of how the Salvation Army has responded to a land and water search for a lost person will be provided. An overview of how the Salvation Army integrates our response and services with state, county, local emergency managers and other voluntary organizations will be discussed.
SAR Teams: Administrative and Operational Best Practices	Getting a SAR Team up and running can be challenging. Once operational, long-term sustainability can be challenging as well. So, how do teams do it?
Dan Martin	This session will include a facilitated discussion regarding best practices for SAR Teams. Information will be presented, but attendees will also learn from each other. Topics will include volunteer recruitment, training, equipment procurement, leadership, volunteer management, team building, and more.
SarTopo for Search Management Matt Roop	This session will be a crash course in the SarTopo website and how to set up a search on SarTopo so searchers can use the phone app in the field. The session will cover some key points that the Woodford County team likes and dislikes. The session will also teach users how to incorporate drone search zones on the map.
Team Building Kim Gotte	This is a hands-on course, so please bring your laptop.  Team building is important in all things where people work together. Why not make it fun? Join your fellow SAR members in a competition in events like pool noodle relay, SAR backpack relay, rope throw bag distance toss, cone head challenge, egg obstacle course, balloon smash, and more.
